Fifty-two candidates are running for office in the freshman elections now in the Student Union Building (SUB).

Primary elections started at 8:30 a.m. and will continue until 4 p.m. Runoff elections are scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 6.

In the 1959 race for Freshman President there are eight candidates. Bruce Stratton, a South Park graduate, was President of his junior and senior classes and of the National Forensic League.

He received the Outstanding Youth of 1958-59 award from the Beaumont Optimist club. He was also presented a high school debate award and forensics award. He was governor of Hi-Y Youth and Government; Lt-governor of Lone Star Boys State; president of the Texas-Louisiana Hi-Y district. He was the Texas delegate at the 8th National Hi-Y Congress and at 1st annual Colorado Hi-Y conference. He was a member of the student council for three years.
