Royce Wayne Shelton, who is attending Texas A&M at College Station suffered a broken left hand in football practice the past week.

Royce is a member of the Freshman squad, receiving the injury when his hand was caught in a helmet of one of the players on the opposing team.

He was treated at the College hospital, where his hand was put in a cast for six weeks. Doctors say he will not be able to work out with the team for the remainder of the year.

Royce Shelton Gets Honorable Mention, All-American Rating

He is a graduate of Malakoff High School, Class of 1956. He has previously attended Texas A&M College, Navarro Junior College at Corsicana, and Arlington State College at Arlington. He was recently named to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

Royce Shelton Boosts Track Hopes at SFA

NACOGDOCHES, Tex.—Royce Shelton, son of Mr. and Mrs. I. V. Shelton of Malakoff, is on the track team at Stephen F. Austin State College.

Coach Charles Barker says that Royce was making a big contribution to a SFA track program in which more and more emphasis is being placed.

Shelton won first place at Hutchinson, Kan., at the NCJAA track meet in the high hurdles and second place in the low hurdles, while attending Arlington State College. Last week Shelton gave the Lumberjacks a victory by winning first place in the low hurdles in a meet at Huntsville. He placed third in the high hurdles and tied for third in the high jump.

Holdouts Make Poor Start

Mantle Goes 0-for-4 in First Game

Does it really pay to hold out? Financially, sometimes. Physically, seldom.

Mickey Mantle and Lew Burdette, most persistent of the big name 1960 holdouts, played regulation baseball for the first time this spring in Florida Thursday. Neither really was ready.

Mantle, with an old knee injury aggravated by a training speedup, went 0-for-4 as his New York teammates were slaughtered 10-3 by the St. Louis Cardinals at St. Petersburg.

Burdette, again counted as Milwaukee's No. 1 right-hander, took the mound only five days after signing. The light-hitting Chicago White Sox nailed him for three runs in a ninth-inning rally, but the Braves won 9-7 at Sarasota.

Both stars were overshadowed in the exhibition games.

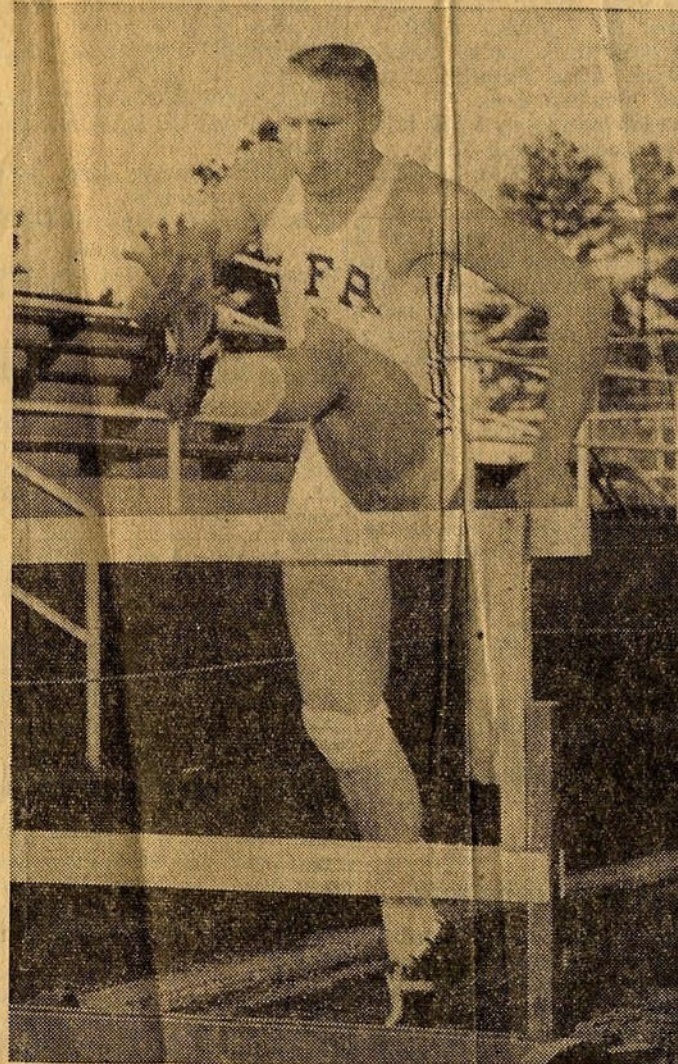
St. Louis shortstop Daryl Spencer homered three times for five runs batted in to steal Mantle's slugging role. And Burdette's teammate, Hank Aaron, drove across six runs with a two-run homer and a bases-clearing double to pace the Braves, who led 7-4 when Burdette replaced starter Joey Jay in the sixth inning.

The Braves, however, were cheered by Red Schoendienst's best day of the spring. Red, hustling for his old second base job after being sidelined by tuberculosis last year, had a double and two singles in the five innings he played.

In other Florida games, Washington defeated Los Angeles 9-7 at Orlando, Pittsburgh beat Baltimore 3-2 in 10 innings at Fort Myers, Detroit whipped Philadelphia at Clearwater, and in a game at Tampa, Kansas City defeated the Cardinals 4-3 and 10-
